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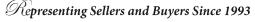






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BANDIT & MAX

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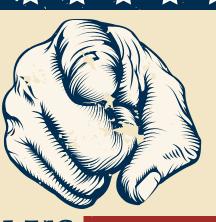
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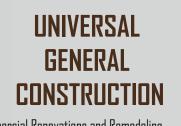

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Before You Medicate - Investigate!

When it comes to treating mood disorders, sometimes the symptoms are a sign that something else may be awry.

Fatigue, low mood, insomnia, mood swings, inattention, agitation, rapid heartbeat, racing thoughts. Sound familiar? These symptoms often result in a prescription for an antidepressant or antianxiety medication.

But what if I were to tell you that these symptoms may be a message that something else is awry besides a "chemical imbalance "in the brain?

In the six decades that psychotropic medications have been studied, the conclusions about their use and effectiveness have been confusing and conflicting. In October 2004, the FDA issued a "black box "warning about an increased risk of suicidal thoughts or behavior in children and adolescents treated with Selective Serotonin Reuptake Inhibitor (SSRI) medications. In 2006, the FDA extended this warning to young adults up to the age of 25.

As an adolescent and young adult medicine physician, I have great concern about these potential side effects as do many of my patients. But what do we do when we have symptoms that interfere with our ability to function in everyday life? Perhaps we should be digging deep and looking at the root causes of the symptoms before making a psychiatric diagnosis and starting medication.

The symptomatology that we often associate with psychiatric diagnoses may be due to a multitude of medical issues. A growing body of research is showing that the complex relationship between the gut, brain, immune and hormonal systems may drive symptomatology that may be labeled psychiatric.

If you pick up just about any health book or magazine published in recent years, you will likely find information about how inflammation is the driving force behind many illnesses including heart disease, obesity and diabetes to name a few. We now know that depression and other psychiatric illnesses may be driven by the inflammatory process as well. But what creates the inflammation?

The answer to this is likely multifactorial and unique to each patient. It is possible that the foods we eat, the integrity of our gut, the diversity of our gut bacteria, the medications we take, food sensitivities and psychological stress in and of itself can be driving forces in inflammation. This can become a vicious cycle: the

inflammatory process can trigger depression and it can be perpetuated by depression or other stresses. Other potential triggers of psychiatric symptomatology include autoimmune diseases such as Celiac Disease, Hashimotos's thyroiditis, Grave's disease and Lupus. Endocrine disorders such as hypothyroidism, hyperthyroidism and adrenal fatigue or insufficiency may also drive symptoms.

In addition, we need to consider metabolic issues such as blood sugar imbalance (dysglycemia), Polycystic Ovarian Syndrome (PCOS) and insulin resistance as potential symptom drivers. Micronutrients including B vitamins, folate, magnesium, vitamin D and zinc are essential to the body's functionality and production of neurotransmitters. Deficiencies in these micronutrients may affect mood. Fatty acid deficiencies can impact mood and should be investigated and addressed as well.

The potential causes of mood disorders are vast. While there may be a role for psychotropic medications in certain cases, untangling the web to discover your individual cause deserves a closer look in partnership with your doctor. So before you medicate – investigate. You may be surprised at what you find.

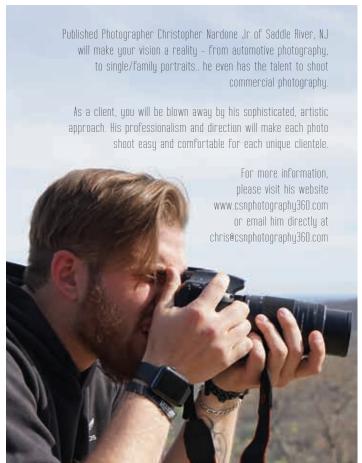
Getting WHAT YOU WANT!

When selling your home, everything from the price to whether the chandelier stays or goes is negotiable. But negotiating the terms should never be an, "I win, you lose." situation. Rather, it should be, "I win, you win!"

The best negotiations end with all parties feeling like they've won. When Buyers and Sellers feel they came to a fair and amicable agreement, they want to move forward together. To get to that point, negotiations often involve give and take on both sides.

Home Sale Negotiation TIPS:

1. Let your Agent do your bidding. That's what you've hired the Agent for, so let 'em handle the bargaining! They will avoid things becoming too "personal."





- 2. Buyers and Sellers may have met when the Buyer visited the property. Once the offer is submitted, they should never see each other again until at the closing table. By remaining apart and unseen, there's no chance your words or body language can be misinterpreted. You want the other side to focus on the deal, not you.
- 3. Get it in writing is a universal truth in any business arrangement. It's a fundamental rule in real estate, too! Do not negotiate orally ... ever! Put every step of the negotiation in writing. If the Seller agrees to leave the deck furniture, put it in the contract. If the Buyer agrees to allow the Seller to remain in the house for two weeks after closing, put it in the contract. Otherwise, memories fade and the sale could fall apart when one side or the other says, "I don't remember agreeing to that!"
- 4. Don't go back and forth more than twice. If there is a third round of counter-offers, very often the chance of both parties coming together falls dramatically. When the Buyer makes the initial offer, the Buyer is thinking about the house and the Seller is thinking about his impending move. Essentially, they are both focused on their next move. When the Seller makes a counter-offer, both sides start to lose their focus. Too often, Buyers and Sellers begin to make it personal and focus on each other as a competitor, fail to prioritize, and that's when deals can break down. Consequently, determine what you want (and don't want), early in the negotiations.
- 5. If you reach an impasse on an item, don't dwell on it. Rather, skip it, get an agreement on everything else and then come back to it. That way, you can build positive momentum toward a done deal; otherwise, you may never get past a sticking point. By isolating points of disagreement, the negotiations can go much easier.

When buying or selling a home, always remember, the home sale negotiation process should not be a war of wills. It's a business transaction. Wars have casualties, not happy endings at the closing table. It's about both sides coming together amicably, getting all the papers signed and having the keys change hands.

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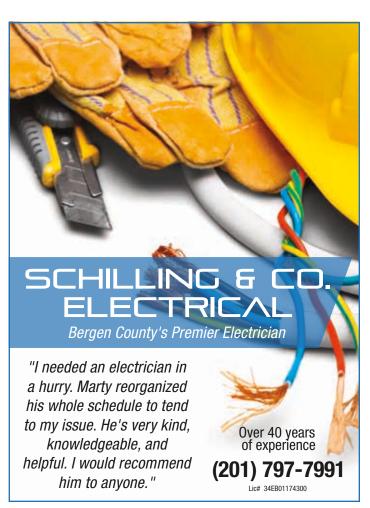
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teacher feature

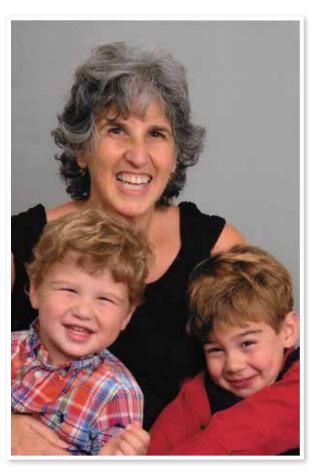
Ms. Wineburgh

Mr. Damian Ross

Mr. Ross is a trainer, martial arts instructor, and Saddle River Resident. He lives here in Saddle River with his wife, Angela, and his children Olivia & Damian. I interviewed him about his job.

SADDLE RIVER MAGAZINE: What inspired you to be a martial arts instructor?

MR. ROSS: I watched movies involving martial arts, which interested me.

SRM: As a child, did martial arts interfere with studying? MR. ROSS: No. Martial arts were just a hobby for me, and I always made time for studying.

SRM: What is your favorite type of martial arts? MR. ROSS: In martial arts, I like judo and wrestling.

SRM: Do any other family members do martial arts? MR. ROSS: Yes, and it happens to be how I met my wife.

SRM: Do you find the hours of work overwhelming? MR. ROSS: Not at all.

SRM: What do you eat before competitions? MR. ROSS: Before the weight test, I normally won't eat, but after, I like to eat a peanut butter and honey sandwich on Ezekiel bread.

SRM: Is there an offseason in martial arts?

MR. ROSS: In wrestling, I have an offseason, and in judo, it depends, because you can always go practice.

SRM: How old were you when you first started martial arts?

MR. ROSS: I started wrestling when I was 7. I later began Tae Kwon Do when I was 15, then Combatives when I was 21, and Judo and Jujutsu when I was 28. I'm a second-degree black belt in Tae Kwon Do, second Degree black belt in Judo and a fourth-degree black belt in Tekkenryu, Jujutsu and Combatives.

SRM: What advice would you share with somebody starting martial arts for their first time?

MR. ROSS: Find a place to practice that you like, find a style of martial arts that you like, and follow your instinct.

SRM: If you could change one thing about your sport, what would it be and why? MR. ROSS: The one thing I would change is the misconception that you need to spend years of training to protect yourself. Martial arts and combat sports are different than self-defense. Every year millions of people without any training at all successfully protect themselves and their families. Self-defense is a life skill, not a lifestyle.

SRM: Thank you, Mr. Ross. Is there anything else you would like to add? MR. ROSS: As a lifelong martial artist, I realized that most people are too busy and don't have the time to dedicate to martial arts training, but everyone needs self-defense. The Self Defense Company will help people protect themselves through online training and personal protection products.

Diane Luciana-Wafer isn't your average attorney...

GDR: You have a very challenging job, tell us

DLW: Well yes, I am a litigation attorney in Hackensack NJ. My firm is Luciana-Luciana

GDR: Who is the other Luciana?

DLW: "My father, who is a criminal attorney. He is 93 years old and still works. He goes to court every day! If I need another brain when working on a case, I ask my dad for advice. He is always on point and so smart.

GDR: Ok I know you are a civil and criminal litigation attorney which means you have to fight hard for your client depending on the nature of the casebut there was something else you had to fight hard for?

DLW: "YES MY OWN LIFE! I had been practicing law for 37 years. In that time, my sister Susan, my husband, Colin Wafer and myself were all diagnosed with cancer. I fought for years and beat it! Unfortunately, my sister and my husband did not!"

GDR: Oh Diane I am so terribly sorry! Was your sister Susan also an attorney? **DLW:** No she was a paralegal in my office and we worked together for 16 years

GDR: What is the Susan Luciana breast cancer fund about?

DLW: "When my sister passed, I started Fundraisers. And a Foundation called "The Susan Luciana Breast Cancer Fund" Every year in October, myself and another breast cancer survivor, host a fundraiser starting with a dinner and plenty of tickets to purchase for various gifts, which raises money for the Foundation ... and then every year on Susans birthday, my parents donate money, and I match it with my own money. I never take a salary or reimbursements for any of the charity events.

GDR: You are amazing Diane! Now that you raise all this money and have formed this Foundation... What is it for?

DLW: "I am on the Englewood Hospital Foundation Board" and Englewood Hospital has a program called Patient Navigator at the breast center. The respective job is to direct patients to ME that have breast cancer and quality of life needs! (This is done through an application process and the patient must be eligible) So with the money from my sisters Foundation, I help them pay their rent or provide wigs or anything they need or want! For instance, one

woman wanted a stove to cook a Thanksgiving dinner, so I bought her the stove.

GDR: This is such a heartfelt story, Diane! You must have touched so many lives!

DLW: It turns out to be one woman a month and counting. I give them hope when they feel hopeless! And I feel that my life was saved and I just want to help! Susan would have wanted it this way!

DLW: I also have an organization called Women Lawyers in Bergen County. Over 100 women are involved, and It was formed to promote and mentor young lawyers. We sponsor legal education classes for these women. In addition, we donate to "Shelter our Sisters" which is a temporary shelter in Teaneck for battered women with children. It gives them a chance to get their lives together.

GDR: I had to cut the interview short for Diane was running off to her next accomplishment which was being honored as a DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI by FORDHAM UNIVERSITY LAW SCHOOL at the annual Chapter New Jersey Dinner!

I sat there teary-eyed just thinking "What a beautiful giving soul" I was talking to and what a touching interview with a woman that has accomplished so much by helping so many women! She worked every day as a widow, dealing with her own illness all while raising her two outstanding children, Derek, her son who is a volunteer firefighter here in Saddle River, and attends Syracuse University. And Elizabeth, her daughter who attends Fordham University and has studied abroad. Mufasa is the family cat which I nominated "best cat hair cut", pleasantly sat in on the interview.

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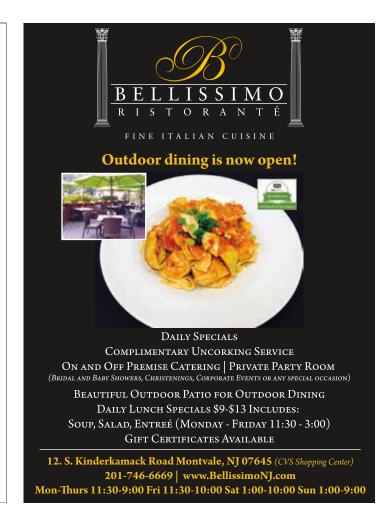
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POLICE UNITY TOU

The "thin blue line" was out in force in early May when Saddle River's own, Police Officer Dan Strasser, joined over 1,500 other police officers proudly wearing blue and riding bicycles to Washington D.C in the Police Unity Tour. The Police Unity Tour began in 1997 with 18 riders in New Jersey raising \$18,000 to raise awareness of law enforcement officers who have died in the line of duty. Since then, the event has grown into an annual tradition with nine chapters throughout the country comprised of over 2,000 members who have raised over \$20 million! The monies raised benefit the Law Enforcement Officers Memorial and Museum in Washington, D.C. and the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund.

Inspired by the Police Unity Tour's motto, "WE RIDE FOR THOSE WHO DIED," Officer Strasser made the grueling three-day, 300-mile bicycle ride from Florham Park to Washington D.C. with riders from Chapter 7. With police escorts along the way, support

teams accompanying the riders and supporters lining the streets, the Police Unity Tour brought together officers and communities from 40 states, and even some from other countries, to honor those who made the ultimate sacrifice to protect and serve.

Officer Strasser was inspired to participate in the ride to honor Waldwick Police Officer Christopher Goodell, who was killed in 2014 in the line of duty on Route 17 at the young age of 32. As Officer Strasser explained, "For me, the Police Unity Tour was just a very small way to honor police officers killed in the line of duty and to show my support to the families of fallen officers."

After completing the 300-mile ride, Officer Strasser joined the other chapters who rode from all parts of the country for the final ride into the National Law Enforcement Officer's Memorial for the Candlelight Vigil. "The Police Unity Tour was an experience of a lifetime," remarked Officer Strasser.

"The overwhelming support from the communities along the ride was heartwarming. It is hard to tell you a specific moment that was better than the rest; however, looking back today, the final few miles into the National Law Enforcement Officer's Memorial in Washington D.C. will stick with me forever."

In order to ride in the Police Unity Tour, officers must raise at least \$1,850 and purchase all their own equipment and gear. Officer Strasser raised over \$2,300! He would like to thank the generous Saddle River residents who donated money to the Police Unity Tour and to purchase his bike, as without them he would not have been able to show his support and represent the Saddle River Police Department in this great cause. It was such an incredible experience that Officer Strasser plans on making it an annual tradition and participating in next year's tour, but this time with other members of the Saddle River Police Department! Stay tuned for the opportunity to participate in next year's tour!

The Borough of Saddle River has been successful in offering its residents the second lowest real estate tax rate in Bergen County. The low tax rate has resulted in sustained higher property values, despite the fact that the NJ State legislature has adopted crushing regulatory burdens and other financial restraints on property owners with little regard to property rights or the State economy.

Real estate taxes levied and the manner in which they are calculated in New Jersey is a special kind of marvel. When you want less of something, tax it! In an inverse correlation, property values diminish with the rise of property taxes creating a lower demand for housing and investment. Properties with higher taxes have always been less attractive to any rational buyer.

Real estate property tax in NJ is calculated based on a tax rate set by the NJ State bureaucracy and a periodic assessment of a property value performed by a government contractor. The assessment is based on the recent sales of similar properties in the vicinity within a specified period of time for comparison.

The calculation is based on two factors: the assessment of land and improvement, i.e. building or a house.

Land assessment, in general, is more uniform and consistent among properties. The main factors affecting land assessment are the size of a property, topography and its best use under the existing zoning restrictions and environmental regulations. This assessment is relatively straightforward and tangible.

On the other hand, the assessment of an improvement may vary tremendously from one property to another. It is calculated using a progressive scale based on factors such as the square footage, number of bedrooms, bathrooms, basement conditions, existing updates and the quality of the finishings. This progressive methodology forces a property owner with a larger or updated house to carry a higher tax burden than his neighbor with little or no difference to the services provided to both residents living in the same municipality. This tax burden distribution or so-called "fair share" is far from being fair or moral. It can be traced directly to Karl Marx Communist Manifesto, which dictates that those with their ability must provide to those with their need while bureaucrats are in charge of the process. In other words, under the existing property tax code, success is being punished and mediocracy rewarded which stifles growth and destroys the economy.

Except the times when a property is being assessed, there is very little correlation between the assessed value and market value. The primary reason is the fact that the market value is continuously changing with the market sentiment and the assessed value is generally constant during the period between the assessment intervals.

There are two different property tax rates -- one to calculate the tax bill and the other used to compare one municipality to another.

General Tax Rate is used to determine the amount of real estate tax levied upon a particular property. This rate is used to calculate the tax bill. For

example, if the current 2016 tax rate in Saddle River is 1.019% and a property assessment is at \$1,000,000 the tax bill would be \$10,190 for that particular year.

Effective Tax Rate is used to compare one municipality to another based on the assumption that all municipalities are at 100% valuation. This rate is calculated by the State of New Jersey Department of the Treasury using County equalization average ratios. This rate is not to be used to calculate the tax bill.

The bottom line is that low property tax is one the main reasons that attracts buyers and investors to Saddle River making it the best town to live in Bergen County.

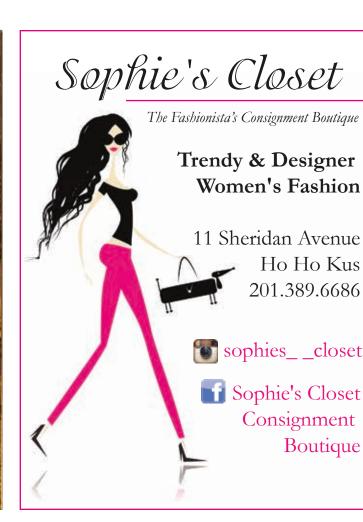

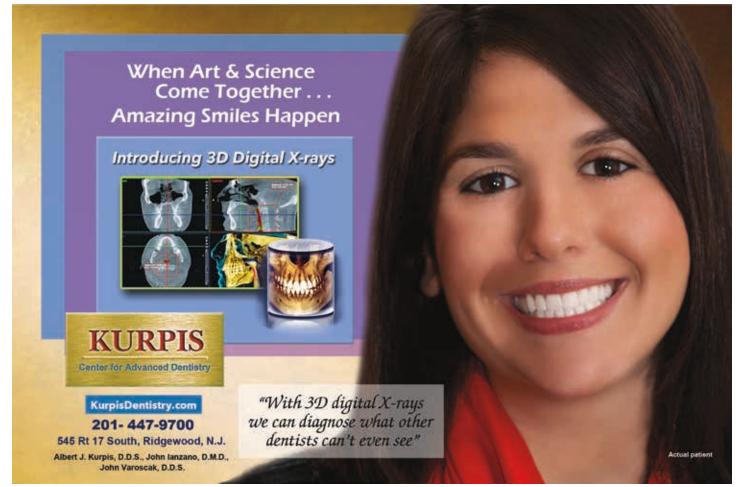

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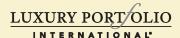

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everything you need to know

What is it?

Lyme Disease is an infectious disease acquired through contact with bacteria-infected ticks—most commonly the black-legged tick. Some symptoms of Lyme disease include fever, fatigue, headaches, and a bulls-eye shaped rash called erythema. According to the Center for Disease Control, this rash only appears in 70-80% of cases. These ticks can quickly move on to pets, but the rash they acquire may be different from the characteristic bulls-eye. See a doctor immediately if you believe a tick has bitten you and notice these symptoms, as they can get worse if left untreated.

How do I avoid getting it?

Ticks are typically located in tall grass, so use insect repellent whenever camping or hiking. Parents should ensure that their children use insect repellent and wear clothes that cover their arms and legs sufficiently when playing outdoors.

You can reduce the risk of ticks showing up in your yard by:

- 1. Maintaining your lawn with frequent mowing
- 2. Removing stray trash and leaves from your property
- 3. Keeping playground equipment and patio furniture away from woodland or forest area
- 4. Lining the border between your property and the woods with gravel and woodchips
- 5. Clearing any large bushes around the edges of your property Make sure you check your pets for ticks daily if they go outdoors. Ask your veterinarian for recommendations of products that help prevent ticks from latching onto your pet.



Treating Lyme disease can be easy. If you show any of the symptoms described, simply see your doctor immediately and get an antibiotic. Be sure to inform your doctor if you are pregnant or suspect you are pregnant, as certain antibiotics can hinder fetus development. Once treated, recovery from Lyme Disease should be full and rapid. Very rarely, in exceptional cases, does recovery take an extended period of time. Should symptoms persist, see your doctor for further treatment.

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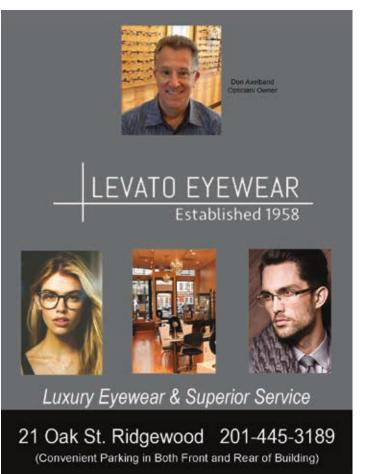

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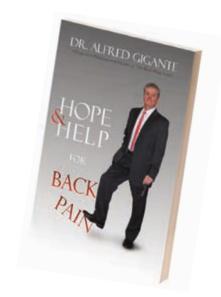

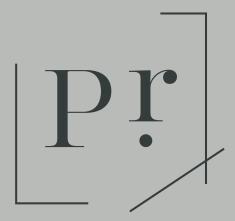

Joe Arahill was anxious to get back in the swing of things. With that motivation, the avid golfer was back on the links after only 15 sessions in Christian Health Care Center's outpatient short-term rehab program following a total shoulder replacement. 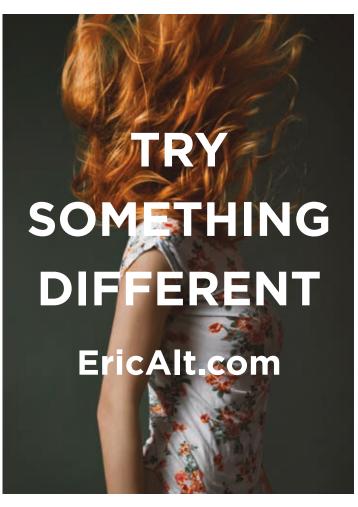

what is Mindfulness-Based Meditation and why should I try it?

It seems like we are hearing more and more about mindfulnessbased meditation and the role it plays in stress reduction. But what exactly is mindfulness-based meditation and why is the practice getting so much attention?

the attitudinal foundation of mindfulness. We are encouraged to have a warm, open curiosity about life. In addition, according to an article in the Harvard Business Review, "Neuroscientists have also shown that practicing mindfulness affects brain areas related to perception, body awareness, pain tolerance, emotion regulation, introspection, complex thinking, and sense of self."

Another wonderful aspect of mindfulness is that it is flexible and can be personalized to fit into an individual's lifestyle. You can actually benefit from short meditations and, believe it or not, you can meditate just about anywhere!

Greater Good in Action, which was formed through a collaboration between UC Berkeley's Greater Good Science Center and HopeLab, has the following tips for beginning your mindfulness practice:

- Pay close attention to your breathing, especially when you're feeling intense emotions.
- Notice really notice what you're sensing in a given moment, the sights, sounds, and smells that ordinarily slip by without reaching your conscious awareness.
- · Recognize that your thoughts and emotions are fleeting and do not define you, an insight that can free you from negative thought patterns.
- Tune into your body's physical sensations, from the water hitting your skin in the shower to the way your body rests in your office chair.

Mindfulness-based meditation can make a genuine impact on an individual's ability to manage his or her stress. Adds Dr. Katz, "And, in today's fast-paced and competitive environment, being able to mitigate the impact of life's stressors on our physical and emotional health is more important than ever!"

- Grillmarkadurinn and Fishmarkadurinn are equally a must try in this city. With ingredients purchased directly from the country's farms and fishermen, the quality of the food is excellent.
- While walking around the city a stop at Baejarins Beztu Pylsur for their Famous Hot Dog is something to check off the tourist list!

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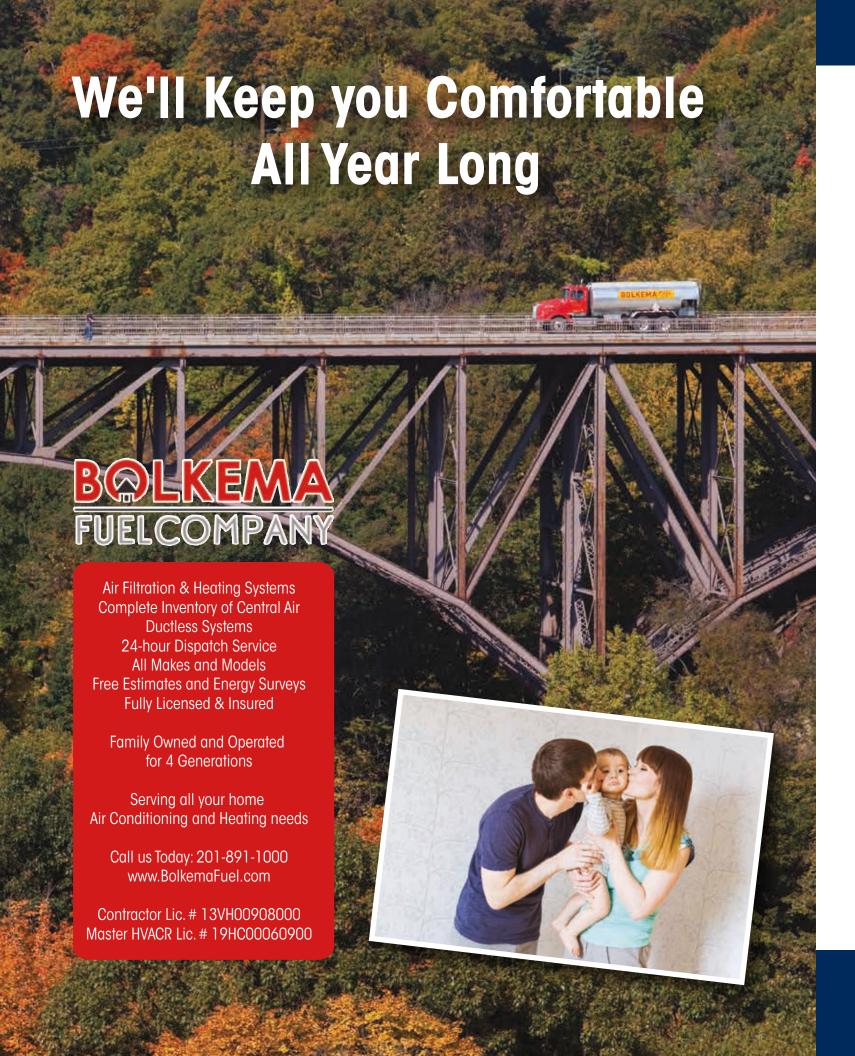


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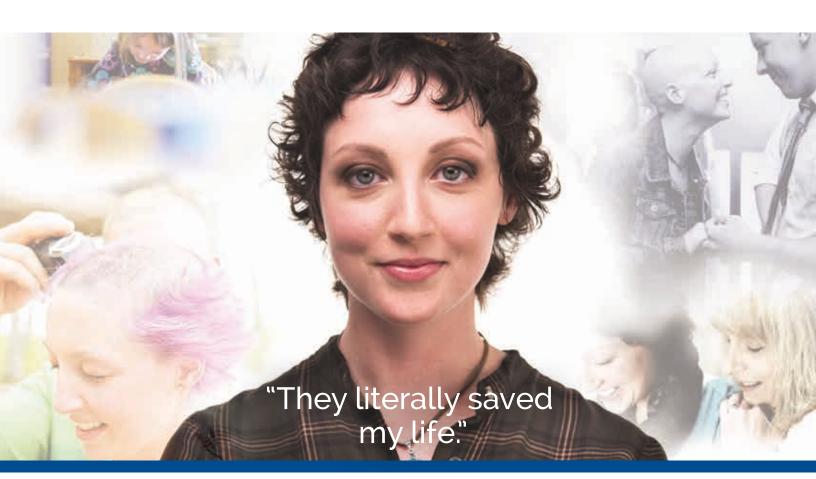
